KEY EVENTS IN HUGUENOT HISTORY

1533 John Calvin flees Paris, becomes pastor in Geneva in 1536 and maintains strong ties and influence with French reform movement until his death in 1564

1550's Calvinism comes to France, wins thousands of converts

1559 First Huguenot synod held, in Paris

1559 Attempt to replace the Catholic Guises with the Huguenot Condé as regent

1560 Huguenots petition the king and threaten revolt if persecution persists

1560 first record of Marquis in Scotland (according to Rollin R. Marquis history including Flora Marquis-Pyle paper referencing Don Marquis letters)

1562 Massacre at Vassy (by Guise) begins the French religious wars

1562 Huguenots sign a manifesto saying they were forced to take arms

1565 Huguenot colony massacred at St. John, Florida by Pedro Mendendez

1572 Catherine de Medici orders an attempt to assassinate Huguenot leader Coligny

1572 St. Bartholomew's Day massacre kills as many as 100,000 French Huguenots


1585 Huguenots and other Protestants are ordered expelled from France (most stay)

1593 Huguenot Henry IV converts to Catholicism to gain the throne


1598 Edict of Nantes promises protection to Huguenot

The later Edict of Fontainebleau, which revoked the Edict of Nantes in October 1685, was promulgated by Louis XIV, the grandson of Henry IV. It drove an exodus of Protestants and increased the hostility of Protestant nations bordering France.


1720 - William Marquis and Margaret Colville Marquis emigrate to America.

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William Marquis (b. 1674, d. Abt. 1750)
William Marquis3 was born 1674 in Antrim3, and died Abt. 1750 in Frederick, Virginia.He married Margaret Colville on 1717 in Ireland, daughter of Robert Colville and Janet Berchell.
Notes for William Marquis:

William was a French Huguenots who fled France because of religious persecution and settled for a time in Ireland. He and his wife Margaret Colvillecame to America in 1720 on a ship named the Mayflower, so named because it sailed on the 100th anniversary of the original Mayflower. Margaret and William with two of their children, Thomas and Mary settling in the Opequon at a later date. When Gov. Spotswood and companions explored this region in 1716, there were no white settlers west of the Blue Ridge Mountains. When Rev. John Selkirk went west from Williamsburg, Virginia in 1735 "there were only a few roads beyond Fredericksburg, and only a few horse paths to the Blue Ridge." "He hoped to join some Ulster Presbyterians in the Shenandoah Country.""The Valley will have to wait a good while to get any number of removers from planted Virginia.
